




Figure 1. 8/20  $\mu s$  Peak Pulse Current wave form acc. IEC 61000 - 4 - 5




Figure 2. Typical Capacitance  $C_{\mbox{\scriptsize D}}$  vs. Reverse Voltage  $V_{\mbox{\scriptsize R}}$ 




Figure 3. Typical Forward Current  $I_F$  vs. Forward voltage  $V_F$ 





Figure 4. Typical Reverse Voltage  $V_R$  vs. Reverse Current  $I_R$ 








Figure 5. Typical Clamping Voltage vs. Peak Pulse Current IPP

Figure 8. Typical max. Clamping voltage at ESD contact discharge (Acc. IEC 61000-4-2)




Figure 6. Typical Clamping performance on - 8 kV - ESD events (Acc. IEC 61000-4-2)






Figure 7. Typical Clamping performance on + 8 kV - ESD events (Acc. IEC 61000-4-2)




## **Application Note:**

a) With the **VESD05A1-02V** one signal or data line (L1) can be clamped to ground. Due to the different clamping levels in forward and reverse direction the **VESD05A1-02V** clamping behavior is <u>Bi</u>directional and <u>Asymmetric</u> (BiAs).
